Water and sewer and trash adequately planned to meet future needs and look at financial benefit of city acquisition. Investigate solar and other renewable resources. Traffic flows smoothly.

Core Values and Vision Discussion

Value: Personal Financial Security Vision: Property Values Maintained

Value: Preserve town character.

Vision: Slow speed of vehicular traffic, few stoplights, dark skies, no sidewalks, rural feel, maintain traditions, architectural control, fountain/park, friendly exchanges with neighbors, downtown and elsewhere.

Value: Sense of Community.

Vision: Fewer gated communities. Continue extraordinary sense of volunteerism and organizations good to know your neighbors.

Value: Public safety.

Vision: Continued sheriff patrol. Volunteerism; block watch patrol; know and look after our neighbors. Care.

Value: Environmental preservation.

Vision: Geographic isolation of town. Limited growth. Preserve views. Dark skies; see stars. Limited industrialization.

Value: Spirit and Vitality of town.

Vision: Mix of age groups. Education and culture. Library. Theater. Museum. Arts council. Adult Education. Senior Center. Service clubs/volunteers. Keep kids from moving away.

Value: Recreational opportunity.

Vision: Good and well-marked access to trails and open space. Information available about recreation with good maps, etc.

Vision Attainment Strategies

- 1. Civic Association (existing) is good and should continue: Reexamine form and culture of government.
- 2. Park, Avenue of the Fountains. Cohesive grouped formed by town to oversee (sense of unity) group of residents to help drive (avoid problems with staff turnover) integrated focused attraction.
- 3. Good planning/zoning commission and enforcement. Make it difficult to get an exemption.
- 4. Strong land conservation policy and no building on hillsides. Regionally integrated planning with municipal neighbors. Information, educated awareness.
- 5. Need city-wide internet access (town run?). Need funding (taxes) to pay good teachers. Consider affiliation/nearby community colleges and ASU: hold night classes at the high school. Population too small to support full-blown community college but many students go straight to community college and may use here.
- 6. Property tax. Retail sales/business taxes. Take over city services (water, trash, sewer, police, fire. Be judicious about spending. Careful consideration and look into future implications, *i.e.* operations and maintenance costs. Interregional lobbying at state legislature re: taxes. If school age population declines, consider school district merger.
- 7. Continue existing strong events—art fair—could be diversified (seems like the same artists all the time). Draw attendance with popular music group. Bring crowd-attracting entertainment to town. Art Fair space becoming more and more limited (cultural council needs to examine...also look at Cave Creek, Carefree, Sedona for comparison purposes.)
- 8. Examine existing resources and determine need for more? This group does not wholly share in this vision...is there really a need? Possible partnerships with municipal neighbors. Need to address limited access to FH...only SR 87 and Shea...other ideas...Via Linda and Dynamite. Lots of discussion on transportation routes.
- 9. Availability of information for citizens on web. Encourage involvement of young people and new people. Some organizations not welcoming...cliquish. Need more accessibility to elected officials. Channel 11 is severely underutilized. Encourage citizens to attend meetings and vote. Volunteer appreciation (Town Council) is good. Citizen boards and commissions.
- 10. We want things from them but what do we have to offer? Periodic dinners or other events, inviting neighbors to network, talk, develop relationships. AZ League of Cities and Towns. FH should initiate relationship.
- 11. NIMBY. Housing market should be what market will bear. If yes, state land may be a good place. Low cost housing causes kids to bear stigma of poverty. No need. Land too expensive! No subsidies. Consider some high density development to make state land more affordable. Policy to set aside a portion of redeveloped areas.
- 12. Property taxes may be needed to provide. Group feels we are doing well. May have already attained this vision. Good now; maintain what we have using necessary means. Require fire sprinklers for new buildings. Urgent care; look at satellite facilities from neighboring hospitals.

- 13. Support and appreciation of elected officials and staff. Town website should have a clear link to Chamber Civic Organizations. Database of organizations and regular communication between/among.
- 14. High price housing; zoning; concern for higher density in redevelopment areas.
- 15. Good information available to residents and visitors. Clear maps, signage. Secure ROW for access, WEB, build trailheads, set aside dollars, seek grant funding in partnership with town.
- 16. Maintain and enforce/strengthen dark sky codes. Partnership with neighboring governments. Educate community on value of wildlife and how to interact with them.

Resident now like smallness of the community; say hello and recognize people on the street so important to me; more safety here than in larger metro areas; agree with needs and architectural issues isn't there any planning to community no rhyme or reason; the town center area it is a shame it could have been another unique area like Kierland and it is a hodgepodge a mishmash and hopefully in future

newer buildings in town center and continuity in building codes. Golf is way too expensive for the avg. person so a municipal course or if you are a resident get a more reasonable rate; we drive all over valley to play golf at reasonable prices; concern about too affluent a community and want a mix of people living here are we able to attract younger couples; need not just a retirement community what will happen to schools and standards if not be able to support.

- 5. Long term resident happy with mountain views etc. But 153 days to get a building permit and rules are difficult, nit/nat to death and inconsistent; 20 feet from road vs. 50 feet from road now. Prices of things are unbelievable \$1,100 for building permits etc. in Payson? And here. Ridiculous.
- 6. Opportunity to see town still in process; back East is really a done deal; the vision will impact 10-15 years down the road; the land trust and density; any light industry or how jobs and families would establish themselves; 4-7.5K more people is crisis/-opportunity; can school teachers afford to live here? Natural resources and preservation; encompass preserve the natural views in strategic plan; Scottsdale is too late.
- 7. Safety and familiarity with neighbors; concerts started; change the volunteers as we grow to more people getting involved; more recycling plastic and glass; performing arts or multi-use facility or part of senior center for more activities.
- 8. Quiet and peaceful and relaxing community; no changes in mind- a satisfied customer.
- 9. Attracted to area is natural beauty and signage, low density and small town feel and close to major cities and sport and cultural events; like the low traffic but maintain that if town grows. Town needs to grow from bedroom community to be more self contained hospital, dining, arts, example of community center attached to school and a variety of ages; providing of jobs broader based than retail and housing.

Number one thing that bugs me is architecture-everything under the sun; Jackie's husband is on architectural committee but doesn't get into the commercial properties and it is all volunteer. Fountains on one side and desert on another and plan to be controlled and lots of thoughts over the years but architectural needs to be controlled. And preserve Friendly atmosphere
- 12. Friendly small town sharing and spirituality of using talents to volunteer for community. Concern for future is a Senior Center and they need to have some attention paid to them; getting squeezed out by other functions as we share with Parks & Recreation and getting squeezed out. Need a freestanding community center for seniors population and participation is growing (have statistics

available). Transportation in and out of the town drive in and out of Phoenix; seniors don't drive and need access to large metro area ; our bus service is not there yet.

13. 1988 resident Town services on permits etc. not like it used to be. The arts and culture, letters and sciences – choir, concerts, art league, and Friday night jazz – marvelous things are happening! I like to see us take advantage of them that we are know as the cultural center of the state. We can become the "Santa Fe of AZ." Trust land ramadas and artist can keep materials and work at times in Fountain Hills – Planetarium. Build on out writers, scientists, artists and couple that with the mountains and scenery – couldn't we attract an institution that combines all of this.

In downtown 3-4 story buildings so set some sort of height limit. Next Thursday AM downtown plan Walnut Creek speaking to Chamber; why not public?
- Limit Growth our group did not come up with that. Keep density as it is now. We don't want to be too dense. Once we get to 30K will be a bit more crowded but not a lot of traffic or too dense or too high rise. Only 125 build-able lots as we are land-locked so didn't think this was a big issue. High, medium or low density. Figures not available but one participant did talk to lot sizes and density issues.

Vision Check

- We like the self-sufficient small town idea. "Grown-up and sophisticated" is a kid but I am thinking of jobs and sophisticated is mostly college graduates and attend arts if that is the meaning. This is a question is of degree.
- Affordability or not? Define "affordability" for Fountain Hills:
 - Protecting property values at the risk of sounding biased.
 - If talking about government too many economic engines. Don't want it to revert back to ghettos, upscale development, cyclical development so can't go back to
 - Not going to be totality affordable. Not sure that we would go into subsidized housing. People have options and diversity of housing today– condos, larger homes and large lots; maintain compatibility to what we have now.
 - City fathers can encourage housing options. Developers can have 77 units and X% of those units have to be lower priced housing. So school teachers can live here.
 - This Country Doesn't Stand For Subsidies! Have school board pay stipend of \$3,000 – 4,000 to teachers who want to move here. Against any subsidies (as un-American).
 - How do we adjust the fear to who should live here? Do we want service people to live here? In NJ we put in lower income housing but there was no transportation? Columbia Maryland example a planned development community with planned needs for housing, transportation, no signage, etc...need planning.

From one of the participants in this group:

The hills are alive With the sounds of Culture and With the sounds that come from A strong, local economy Let's take a look at a plan that will Assure us of a long term strong economy. Let's build on education, culture (arts, letters, sciences) and the natural beauty that surrounds us. Let's also build on this premise: That communities with quality Education institutions tend to have More stable economics. As part of a strategic plan, let's establish a Cadre of AMBASSADORS and a set of guidelines With the single purpose of Establishing a satellite educational institution In FH. By satellite, I mean buildings, Not an antenna. Two examples might be Julliard School of Music West or Cranbrook Academy of Arts and Science West Ambassadors would be residents Who have ties with established Educational institutions who would be Authorized to represent FH as liaisons. With such a plan in place, we can Look ahead to a greater degree of LONG TERM economic stability. Communities with quality Education institutions tend To have more stable economies. Let's tie in with education, culture (arts, Letters, sciences) and the natural beauty that surrounds us. We here in FH have so many things working in our favor. But to take Advantage of all of that, we should now be Making this proposal a component of the larger Strategic Plan. Because it will take time, the sooner we Plan and implement it, the sooner we can See the benefits that will accrue.
